



















































































PPG Model



Timelines and Activities (before drive)

Sept. 20 - 27	 Receive email from Partners in Project Green (PPG) to confirm your bin drop-off and pick-up date Submit information for weekly employee newsletter using Newsletter template Print and place promotional posters and signage about the campaign in strategic locations throughout the building
Oct. 2 - 6	 Bins are dropped off at registered locations by PPG & Electronic Recycling Association Print posters and signage and place on bins Email or print a copy of the Campaign Guide for reception (close to where bins will be supervised) Send out first Email Communications to staff
Oct. 6	Ensure bins are in the correct location for Monday morning

Bin information

- Front lobby close to reception or the security desk (high traffic location)
- Areas that are locked during evenings and weekends
- Provide the reception desk with a copy of the Campaign Guide.
- If your bins are 75% full at any point during the week, consider requesting an additional pick-up for \$100/site for textiles or arrange for additional storage for overflow material.
- Additional pick-ups of E-Waste are **free**.

Textiles: 36" W by 24" D by 36" H

E-Waste: 48" W by 42" D by 48" H

What can you collect in the Textiles bins?

- Clothing (all types)
- Shoes and boots
- Accessories and bags
- General household textiles (blankets, sheets, towels)
- Sleeping bags
- Curtains
- Soft toys (i.e. stuffed animals)
- Note: material must be in plastic bags (transparent or translucent) before being placed into the bin.





What can you collect in the E-Waste bins?

Laptops & Computers:

- Laptops/Computers (Mac and Pc)
- Docking Stations Parts (Motherboards, Hard Drives, Etc.)
- Keyboards, Mice, Wires/Cables

Printers:

- Printers (Inkjet and Laserjet)
- Fax Machines
- Scanners & Copiers

Consumer Electronics:

- Gaming Consoles
- Ipods/Ipads/Mp3
- Stereos, Speakers

Handheld Devices:

- Mobile Phones
- Tablets

All E-waste items can be placed directly into the bin





About Diabetes Canada

 Diabetes Canada collects gently used clothing, electronics and small household items. The \$5 million in annual proceeds (average past two years) help us fund world-leading Canadian research, as well as services for people affected by the disease. We also help the environment by diverting 45 million kg from landfill every year.



Textile Waste – The Opportunity

- An estimated 475,000,000 kgs. of textiles go to the landfill in Ontario each year
- 5-10% of all waste is textiles
- 36 kgs; amount of textile waste per person per year in Canada, which is the equivalent of approximately 1 garbage bag per year
- 85% of all textiles go to landfills
- The clothing industry is the second largest polluter in the world, second only to oil



Textile Recycling – The Impact

ACTION	RESULT
Fundraises	\$5,000,000 contributed to Diabetes research
Sends	2,400 children and youth living with diabetes and prediabetes sent to D-camps
Saves	1 Billion kWh of energy (based on diversion)
Reduces	280 million pounds of CO2 emissions reduced (based on diversion)
Trees Saved	7,257 mature trees
Water Saved	167,828 liters of water
Removes	212,087 cars from road

^{*}based on collection of 45 million kilograms of textile donations



Where Does it Go?

- •100 million pounds of textiles collected and diverted yearly, 95% of the material collected is either reused or repurposed.
- •Of the items that cannot be reused as second-hand clothing; approximately 30% is repurposed (upcycled or downcycled), 20% is turned into post-consumer fibers, 5% ends up as true waste (damaged to the point that no useful application for these items can be found).
- •Diabetes Canada will accept all grades of textiles that are in reusable condition, just as long as they are not soiled or contaminated.
- •100% of all net proceeds raised through our collection program are charitable and support the 1 in 3 Canadians residents that are impacted by diabetes or prediabetes.

E-Waste – The Opportunity

- In 2020, it was estimated that Canadians generated around 724,000 metric tons of e-waste.
- It was estimated that only about 28% of e-waste was recycled.
- 43% of households reported they had e-waste to dispose
- E-waste generation per person increased from 8.3 kilograms in 2000 to 25.3 kilograms in 2020
