- Supporting social impact and community causes





Timelines and Activities (before drive)

DATE	ACTION
Sept. 29 – Oct 3	 Receive your bin drop-off date Submit Newsletter template Print and display event posters in strategic locations throughout the building
Oct. 6 - 10	 Bins are dropped off at registered locations by PPG, Electronic Recycling Association & Second Life Books Print signage and place on bins Email or print a copy of the Campaign Guide for reception (close to where bins will be supervised) Send out first Email communications to staff
Oct. 10	Ensure bins are in the correct location for Monday morning



Timelines and Activities (during/after drive)

DATE	ACTION
Oct. 13-26	 Collect material for Recycling Collection Drive in celebration of WRW in Canada Send out optional reminder email communication to staff (October 20) Take a photo of your staff beside your bins (with your company logo in the photo). Send to Partners in Project Green to share on social media Receive email confirming bin pick-up date by Diabetes Canada, ERA & Second Life Books
Oct. 27-31	Bins are picked up
Nov. 17 - 28	Results Certificates distributed to all participants

Bin information

- Place in a secure but high traffic location
- Provide the reception desk with a copy of the Campaign Guide.
- If your bins are 75% full at any point during the week, consider requesting an additional pick-up for \$100/site for textiles or arrange for additional storage for overflow material.
- Additional pick-ups of E-Waste and Books are free.

Textiles: 36" W x 24" D x 36" H

E-Waste: 48" W x 42" D x 48" H

Books: 15" W x 15" D x 23" H










What can you collect in the Book bins?





About Diabetes Canada

Diabetes Canada collects gently used clothing, electronics and small household items. The millions of dollars raised in annual proceeds help us support the 1 in 3 individuals across Canada that are impacted by diabetes and pre-diabetes.

Through collections, we are able to fund our **world-leading Canadian research**, as well as provide services for people affected by the disease. We also help the environment by diverting **45 million kg** from landfill every year.

Textile Waste: The Opportunity

- An estimated 475,000,000 kilograms of textiles go to the landfill in Ontario each year
- 5-10% of all waste is textiles
- 36 kilograms: the amount of textile waste per person per year in Canada, which is the equivalent of approximately 1 garbage bag per year
- 85% of all textiles go to landfills
- The clothing industry is the second largest polluter in the world, second only to oil



Textile Recycling: The Impact

ACTION	RESULT
Fundraises	Millions of dollars contributed to Diabetes research
Sends	Approx. 2,400 children & youth living with diabetes and prediabetes to D-camps
Saves	1 Billion kWh of energy (based on diversion)
Reduces	280 million pounds of CO2 emissions reduced (based on diversion)
Trees Saved	7,257 mature trees
Water Saved	167,828 liters of water
Removes	212,087 cars from road

^{*}based on collection of 45 million kilograms of textile donations



Where Does It Go?

- **100 million pounds** of textiles are collected and diverted yearly, 95% of the material collected is either reused or repurposed
- Of the items that cannot be reused as second-hand clothing:
 - Approximately 30% is repurposed (upcycled or downcycled)
 - 20% is turned into post-consumer fibers
 - 5% ends up as true waste (damaged to the point that no useful application for these items can be found)
- Diabetes Canada will accept all grades of textiles that are in reusable condition, as long as they are not soiled or contaminated
- 100% of all net proceeds raised through our collection program are charitable



E-Waste



- Total E-Waste Generated: Approximately 724,000 metric tons.
- Recycling Rate: Only 28% of e-waste was successfully recycled.
- **Household Disposal:** 43% of households reported having e-waste to dispose of.
- **Per Capita Increase:** E-waste generation per person rose from 8.3 kilograms in 2000 to 25.3 kilograms in 2020.



Book Waste - The Opportunity



Residential Paper products make up 10% of the solid waste in landfills in Canada. Industrial, commercial and institutional paper products make up 14% of solid waste in landfills in Canada.



Many books sit on shelves for years, gathering dust and taking up valuable space, untouched and unread.



Around 35% of all trees cut down are used to make paper.


We sort the books and media based on age and genre The books are donated, resold, or recycled
